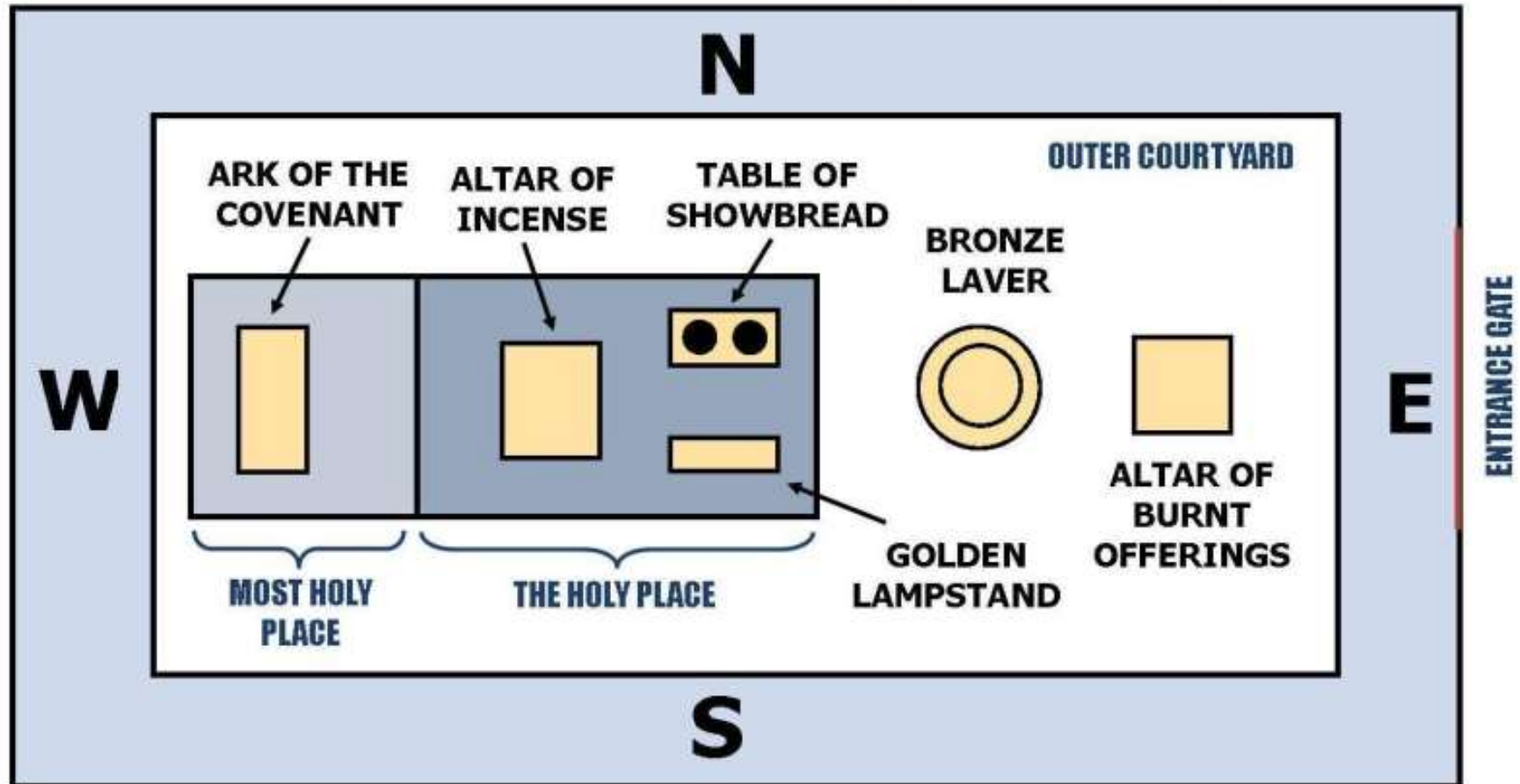

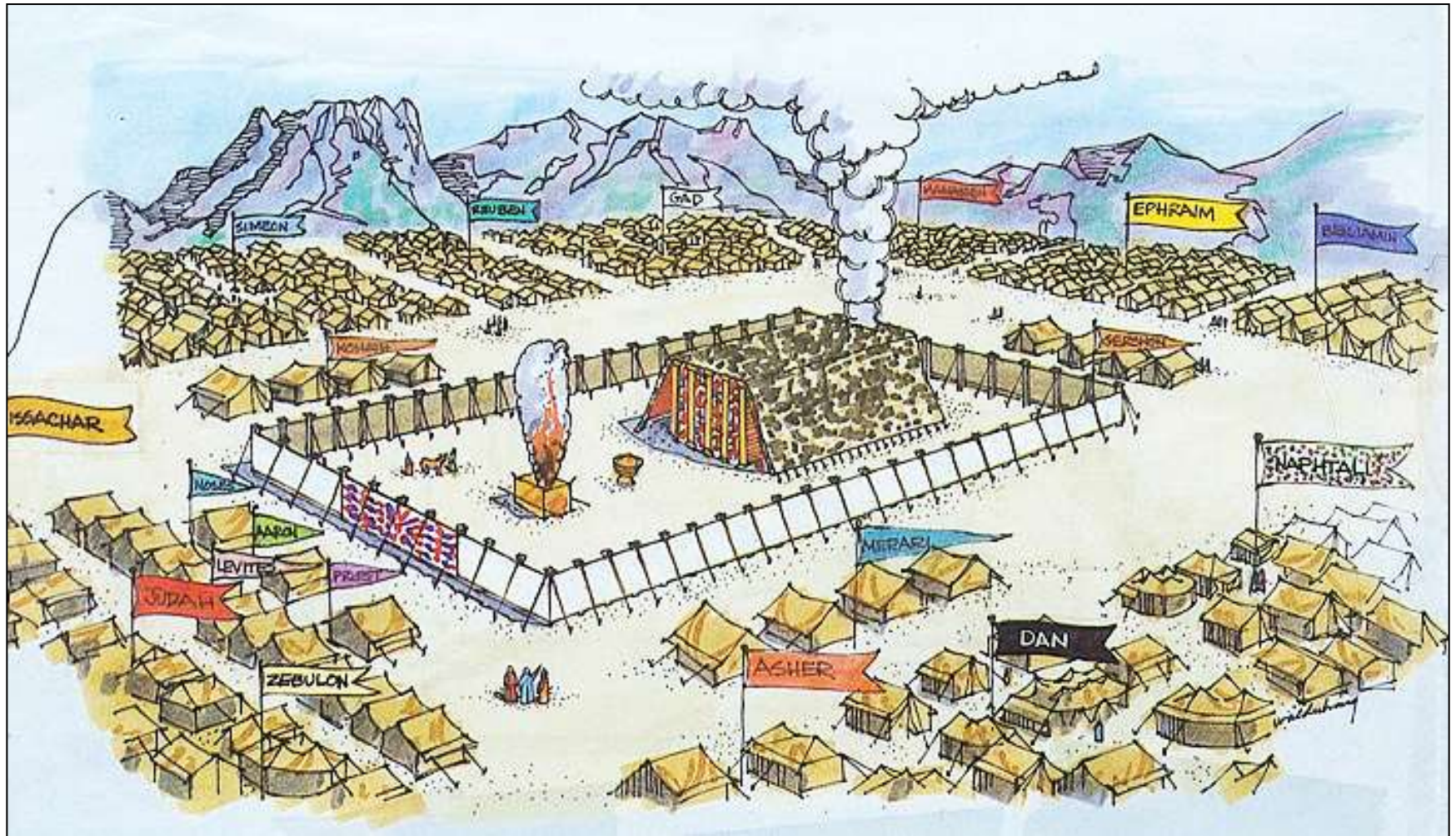
THE TABERNACLE OF MOSES (EXODUS 35-40)

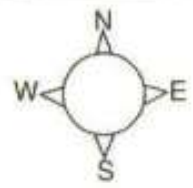

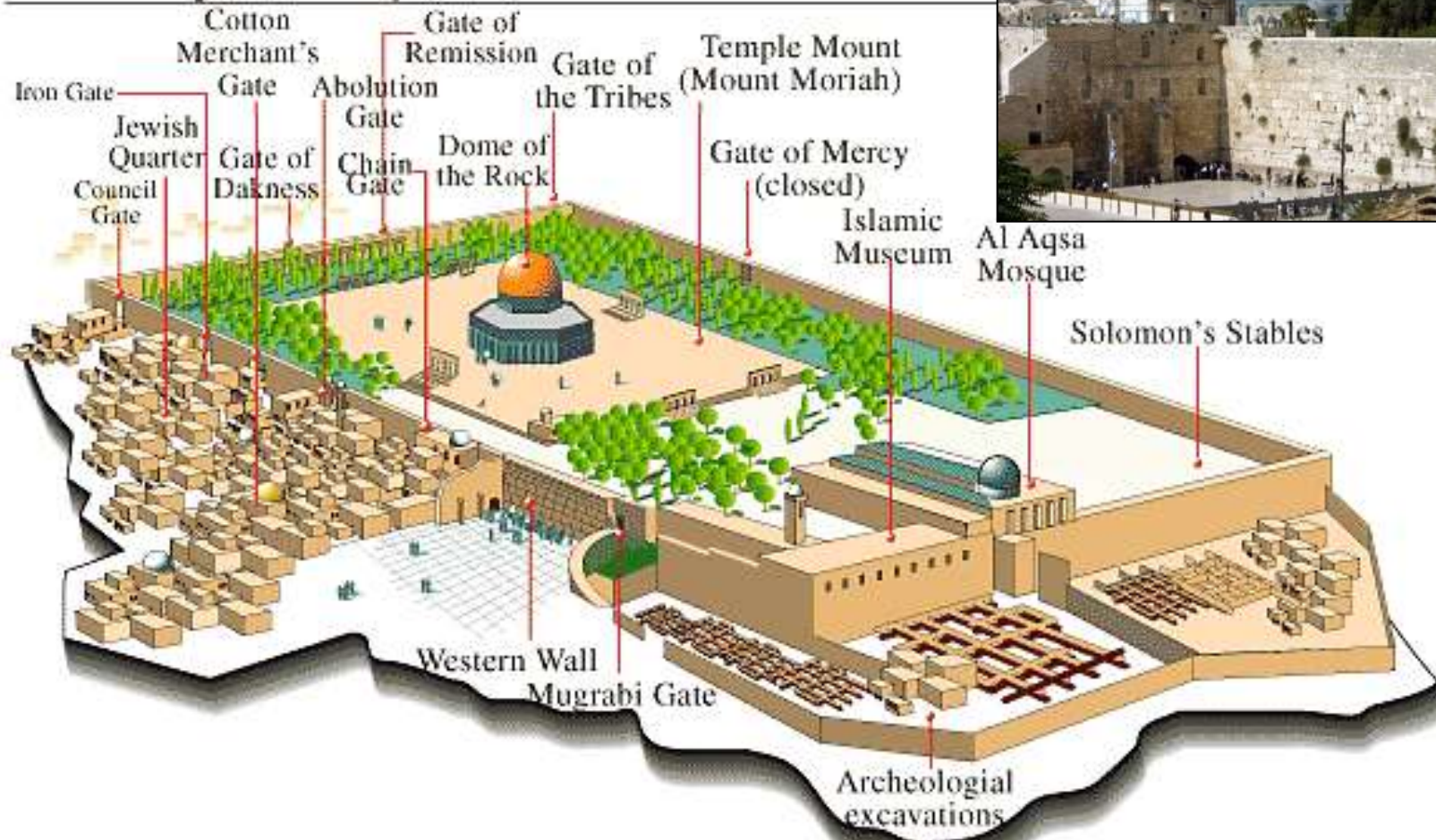

Old City - Temple Mount

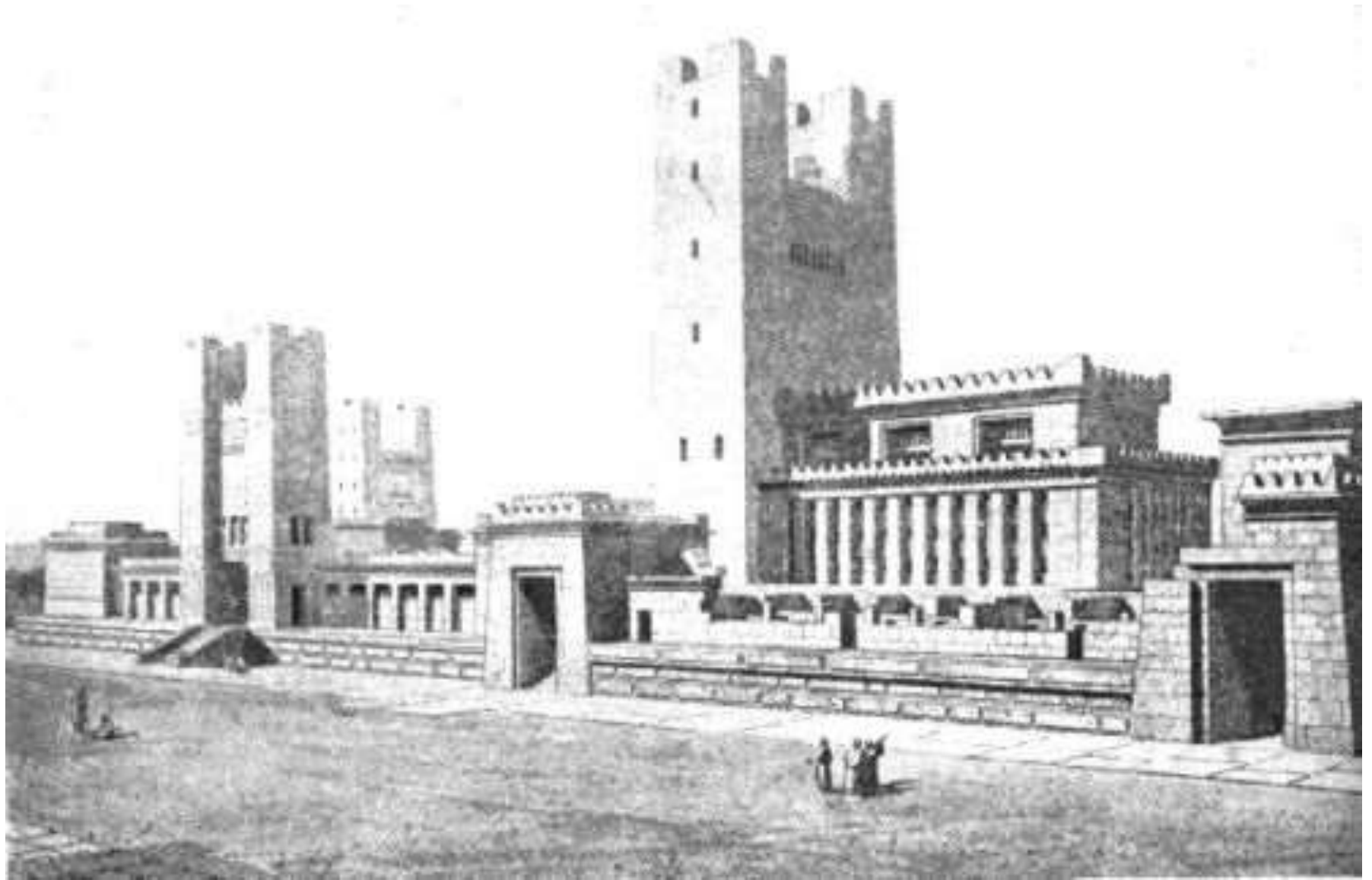

7 Key Features

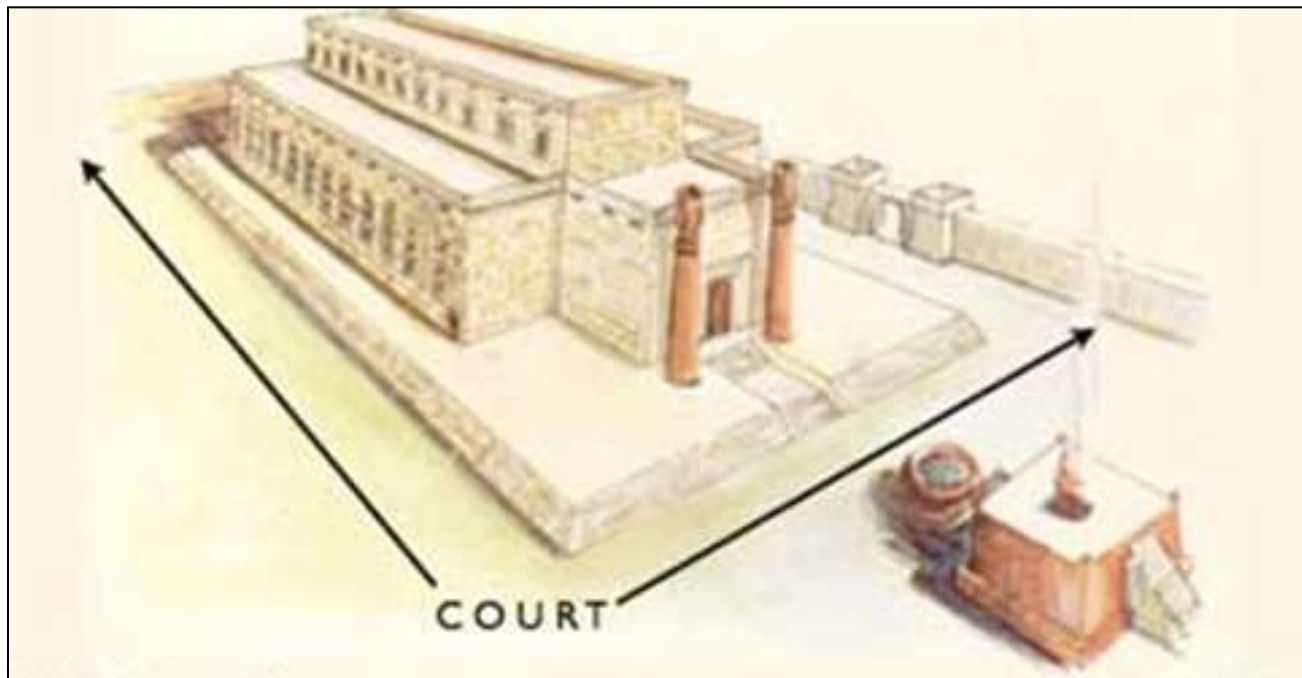
- Ch 40: 1 - 4 Not a building Plan Mountain top view -
 “show the people of Israel”
 Dimensions well beyond temple mount site
- Ch 40: 38 ... OT Judaism context
- Ch 43 The essential promise - the Glory returns
- Ch 47 The River
- Ch 44 : 1 -3 The inhabitants - the Prince
- Ch 45, 48 The tribal land divisions
 (not according to geography of land)
- CH 48: 35 The Climax - The Name :

2, v10 Mountain top view

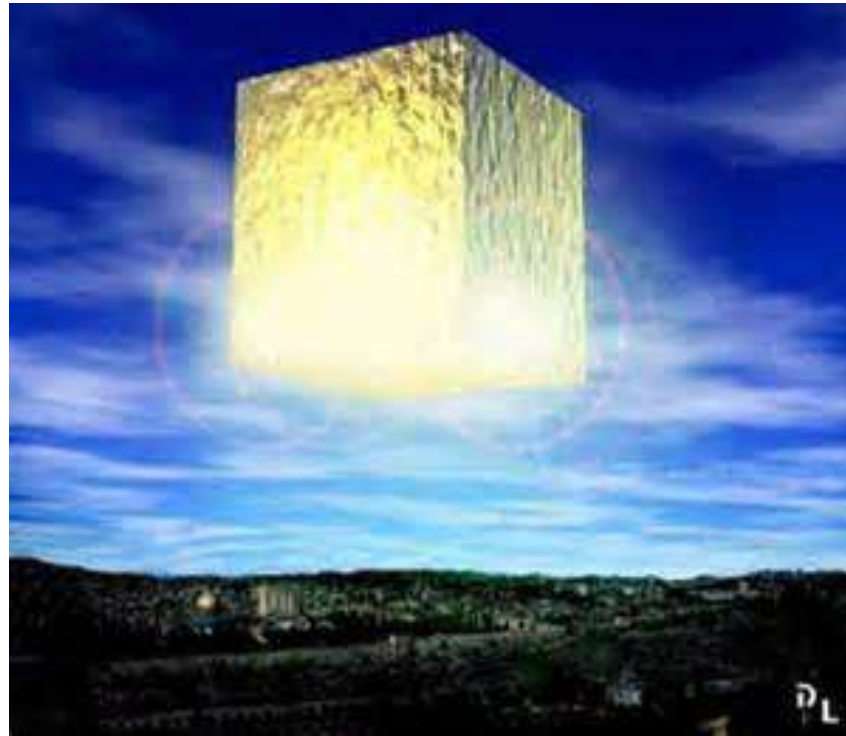
3, v 22 The ultimate temple

6 v 16 note the size 1,400 miles !

The Temple City



The square form of this city probably denotes its stability; while its vast dimensions, being 1,500 miles on each side, are emblematical of magnificence, and of its capability of containing all the multitude of inhabitants which should ever enter it, however immense or innumerable.
