




A long journey from home.

When Joseph arrived at Shechem, a man found him wandering around in the fields and asked him, "What are you looking for?" He replied, "I'm looking for my brothers. Can you tell me where they are grazing their flocks?"

"They have moved on from here," the man answered. "I heard them say, `Let`s go to Dothan.`" v17



So Joseph went after his brothers and found them near Dothan. But they saw him in the distance, and before he reached them, they plotted to kill him.

Why was Reuben different? And why didn't he confront them?


So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe--the richly ornamented robe he was wearing-- and they took him and threw him into the cistern.


they looked up and saw a caravan of Ishmaelites coming from Gilead.

Judah said to his brothers, "What will we gain if we kill our brother and cover up his blood? Come, let's sell him to the Ishmaelites and not lay our hands on him; after all, he is our brother, our own flesh and blood." His brothers agreed. v26-27

So when the Midianite merchants came by, his brothers pulled Joseph up out of the cistern and sold him for twenty shekels of silver to the Ishmaelites, who took him to Egypt.

His plan failed – but God's had not. How do you cope when it doesn't work out your way?


Then they got Joseph's robe, slaughtered a goat and dipped the robe in the blood.

They took the ornamented robe back to their father and said, "We found this. Examine it to see whether it is **your** son's robe." He recognized it and said, "It is my son's robe! Some ferocious animal has devoured him. Joseph has surely been torn to pieces." v32-33

But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope.


