Back to Peter in Acts 9

One important rediscovery for the church in the 16th century Reformation was that salvation was by 'faith alone'.

But it is important to remember that the faith that saves alone is never 'alone'. It is always evidenced by actions.

Cf even the thief on the cross 'stood up for truth' when the other thief criticised Jesus.

In what way does your faith 'show itself'? In this passage from Acts chapter 9 we see several people working out their faith in God.

Acts 9:32-43



As Peter travelled about the country, he went to visit the saints in Lydda. There he found a man named Aeneas, a paralytic who had been bedridden for eight years. "Aeneas," Peter said to him, "Jesus Christ heals you. Get up and take care of your mat." Immediately Aeneas got up. All those who lived in Lydda and Sharon saw him and turned to the Lord.

In Joppa there was a disciple named Tabitha (which, when translated, is Dorcas), who was always doing good and helping the poor. About that time she became sick and died, and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room. Lydda was near Joppa; so when the disciples heard that Peter was in Lydda, they sent two men to him and urged him, "Please come at once!"

Acts 9:32-43



Peter went with them, and when he arrived he was taken upstairs to the room. All the widows stood around him, crying and showing him the robes and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was still with them. Peter sent them all out of the room; then he got down on his knees and prayed. Turning toward the dead woman, he said, "Tabitha, get up." She opened her eyes, and seeing Peter she sat up. He took her by the hand and helped her to her feet. Then he called the believers and the widows and presented her to them alive. This became known all over Joppa, and many people believed in the Lord. Peter stayed in Joppa for some time with a tanner named Simon.

As Peter travelled about the country,


In the early days of the persecution, the apostles stayed in Jerusalem (Acts 8:1)


Now things have quietened down, they spread out sharing the message of Jesus the Messiah. The 'country' would be Judea, Samarian, Galilee and beyond.

A good day!


There he found a man named Aeneas, a paralytic who had been bedridden for eight years.

'A difficult case' – for man




Spirit prompted faith

"Aeneas," Peter said to him, "Jesus Christ heals you.


Get up and take care of your mat."

You won't be needing it from now on.


Peter gives these instructions **before** Aeneas is healed!

Immediately Aeneas got up.




Jesus did it – and he is pleased to use his people in the process.




('all' means quite a large number)

In Joppa there was a **disciple** named Tabitha (which, when translated, is Dorcas),

A woman of faith Why is she called a 'disciple'?

Her name Tabitha (Aramaic) is given and translated for us into Greek (Dorcas, like Tabitha, means "gazelle".

She is represented here as being an older lady.



Her faith in action





and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room.




People treated her body with respect – our temple/tent

Send for Peter




Are they looking for a miracle?

Perhaps the longer Dorcas is dead, they think it will be harder for her to come back.


This is an impossible case!

They show him into the room.



Great sorrow


All the widows stood around him, crying and showing him the robes and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was still with them.

Everybody Ouf - please!

Peter sent them all out of the room;

He needed time to be alone and seek God's will.

He had seen Jesus empty rooms where people were grieving. Was it because they couldn't believe she would live again and an atmosphere of unbelief wouldn't help him,


or possibly because this wasn't a show but something deeply private?

Prayer – a conversation with our Maker

then he got down on his knees and prayed.


In a humble attitude of prayer. A physical acknowledgement of needing God to act.

What he prayed we are not told. It was a personal conversation with his mighty Saviour for wisdom and strength.



Time to speak God's life giving word.

Turning toward the dead woman,



He had been facing away from Dorcas' body while he prayed – but now having sensed it was time to act – he turns.

What is in a name?

Turning toward the dead woman, he said, "Tabitha, get up."

Speaking to her in Aramaic he said 'Tabitha cumi', which sounds very similar to the words Jesus spoke to the 12 year old girl when he raised her from the dead. – 'Talitha cumi' (Mark 5:41)

Of course the meanings are different but they sound so similar, and perhaps the words reminded Peter of Jesus' power on that occasion.



Hello. Who are you?

She opened her eyes, and seeing Peter she sat up.




I don't know if she had met Peter before, but she probably had heard of him.

We are not told what the believers had been doing outside. Any guesses?


The widows (are probably believers too) but they get a special invitation to join the celebration.

The Kingdom of God is growing.




An important link to chapter 10
