
Esther chapter 6


What might have kept him awake? Anxiety Troubled conscience Indigestion ?




It had been recorded at the time but had been forgotten. How did Mordechai feel about being ignored? How would you react?

Another early riser - Haman!




If he had come earlier all this might never have happened.


He can't ask about Mordechai now – his scheme has been totally frustrated.


It must have been quite a surprise for Mordechai after all this time.
